A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
For Discontinuing the Bounties offered for Seamen, and Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS We did, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-second Day of April last, offer certain Bounties therein mentioned to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service; and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant May, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy: And whereas We find it no longer necessary to continue the Armament at Sea; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby revoking and annulling Our said Proclamation of the Twenty-second Day of April last: And We do hereby declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the Payment of the several Bounties thereby offered, shall cease and determine, from and after the Date hereof.

Given at Our Court at *St. James's*, the Sixth Day of *May*, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-three, and in the Thirteenth Year of Our Reign.

Westminster, May 10.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to regulate the Importation and Exportation of Corn.

An Act to allow a Drawback of the Duties of Customs, on the Exportation of Tea to any of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America; to increase the Deposit on Bohea Tea to be sold at the India Company's Sales; and to empower the Commissioners of the Treasury to grant Licenses to the East India Company to export Tea Duty-free.

An Act to enable the Right Honourable Sackville Earl of Thanet to make a Navigable Cut, or Canal, from a Place called the Spring, lying near Skip-ton Castle, in the County of York, to join to, and communicate with, the Navigable Canal from Leeds to Liverpool, in a Close, called Hebble End Close, in the Township of Skipton, in the said County of York.

An Act for draining and preserving certain Fen Lands and Low Grounds, lying in the South Level,

Part of the Great Level of the Fens, commonly called Bedford Level, between certain old Rivers, or Drains, called Stoke River and Brandon River, and a certain Level, or District, called Feltwell New District, and the Hard Lands of Woodhall, in Helgay, and Helgay, in the Counties of Norfolk and Suffolk.

An Act to enlarge the Powers of Two Acts, made in the Eighth and Eleventh Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for making and maintaining a Navigable Cut, or Canal, from the Firth or River of Forth, at or near the Mouth of the River of Carron, in the County of Stirling, to the Firth or River of Clyde, at or near a Place called Dalmuir Burnfoot, in the County of Dumbarton, and also a Collateral Cut from the same to the City of Glasgow; and for making a Navigable Cut, or Canal of Communication, from the Port and Harbour of Burrowstounness, to join the said Canal at or near the Place where it will fall into the Firth of Forth.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the Terms and Powers of Two Acts made in the Thirty-first Year of His late Majesty, and Ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for repairing several Roads in the Counties of Montgomery, Merioneth, and Salop; and for repairing several other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for amending, lighting, and watching, the Highways, or Roads, within the Town, Village, or Chapelry, of Peterham, in the County of Surrey.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road from the Guide Post, at the West End of the Town of Hampton, over Sunbury Common, to the Town of Staines, in the County of Middlesex.

An Act for enlarging and altering the Terms and Powers of Two several Acts, made in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of King George the First, and in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Roads leading from the Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Dudley, in the County of Worcester, and from the said Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, so far as the said Acts relate to the repairing of the said Road leading from the Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Dudley.

An Act for enlarging and altering the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Roads leading from the Market House in Stour-bridge, and other Roads therein mentioned, in the Counties of Worcester, Stafford, Salop, and Warwick, respectively.

An Act for more effectually amending several Roads leading from the City of Exeter; and for rebuilding or repairing Exe Bridge, and making the Avenues leading thereto more commodious; and for building a Bridge over the River Exe, at or near Countess's Wear; and for amending several other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from the North Turnpike Road near Scot Gate, otherwise Sco Gate, in the Town of Stamford, in the County of Lincoln, to Oakham, in the County of Rutland; and from Oakham, through Burley, to a Gate on the North Side of a certain Close, in the said Lordship of Burley, called Booth's Close, adjoining to the open Fields of Cottessmore, in the said County of Rutland.

An Act for enabling James Cox, Jeweller, to dispose of his Museum, commonly called Cox's Museum, by Way of Chance, in such Manner as may be most for the Benefit of himself and his Creditors.

Vienna, April 28. His Imperial Majesty has been pleased to appoint General Elrichshausen to be Commander General in Moravia, General d'Avassalla to be Commander General in Hungary, and General Matthesen to be Commander General in Slavonia; and also to make several Military Promotions, viz. Hague, May 7. The Dutch East-India Company have received an Account, by the first Ship of their homeward-bound Fleet, just arrived in the Texel, that a most terrible Earthquake had swallowed up a great Part of a Mountain upon the Coast of Sumatra, above a League in Length, and destroyed between Two and Three Thousand Inhabitants, with all their Cattle, Plantations, &c. and that the Fire, which issued out of the Earth, had been seen at a very great Distance at Sea.
