PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make Regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by

and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. After Regulation 5 the following regulations shall be inserted:—

"5A. The Admiralty, Army Council or Minister of Munitions may by order if they or he consider it necessary to do so for the purpose of securing the public safety or defence of the realm take over the control and maintenance of any highway, but nothing in this regulation shall relieve any authority or person who, but for this regulation, would have been responsible for the maintenance of such highway from liability for the payment of the cost of such maintenance, and that cost may be recovered by the Admiralty, Army Council or Minister of Munitions from any such authority or person:

"Provided that the amount so recoverable shall not exceed the amount which at the cost of labour and materials ruling during the period in respect of which the amount is claimed such authority or person

would have had to expend in order to maintain the highway in a condition fit to carry the ordinary traffic using the highway previous to the war, nor, in the case where the person responsible is a person other than a local authority, shall it exceed the cost of such works of maintenance as such person could have been required to execute if the road had not been taken over and the traffic on the highway had remained such as it was previous to the war.

"In default of agreement as to the amount to be recovered in any case that amount shall be determined by the Road Stone Control Committee whose decision shall be final.

"For the purposes of sub-sections (2) (3) and (4) of section eleven of the Local Government Act, 1888, any sums contributed under this regulation by an authority shall be treated as costs of maintenance and repair of the highway incurred by the authority.

"For the purpose of this regulation the word 'highway' shall have the same meaning as in the Highways Act, 1835, but shall include 'county bridge.'"

"5B. Where with a view to economising transport and labour the Road Stone Control Committee are of opinion that it is expedient that a county council should obtain a supply of stone, gravel or other materials for making or repairing highways or bridges from any land in the county, the owner or occupier of the land shall, notwithstanding anything in the proviso to section five of the Highways and Bridges Act, 1891, not be disqualified for being elected or for being a member of the county council by reason only of his having a share or interest in a contract for such supply, if the price to be paid for the material under the contract is approved by the said committee."

2. After Regulation 8A the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"8AA. With a view to making the best use of all persons able to work in any industry, occupation or service, it shall be lawful for the Director-General of National Service, after consultation with the Government Departments concerned, by order to prohibit or restrict persons from establishing any new retail trade or business or a new branch of any existing retail trade or business without a licence granted by or under the authority of the Director-General of National Service.

"If any person acts in contravention of or fails to comply with any of the provisions of an order so made, or fails to comply with any condition subject to which a licence under this regulation has been granted to him, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"For the purposes of this regulation the expression 'establishing a new branch of any existing retail trade or business' shall include

(a) the opening of a retail trade or business at premises not theretofore used by the retailer for such trade or business; and

(b) the opening at any premises of a line or department of retail trade or business not previously carried on by the retailer."

3. Regulation 9AA shall be amended as follows:—

(1) The word "and" at the end of paragraph (b) of sub-section (1) shall be omitted.

(2) The following words shall be inserted at the end of paragraph (c) of sub-section (1): "and

(d) The carrying, having or keeping of firearms, military arms; ammunition or explosive substances."

(3) In sub-section (2) for the words "the doing of all or any of the acts" there shall be substituted the words "all or any of the acts and matters."

(4) In sub-section (3) for the words "acts in contravention of" there shall be substituted the word "contravenes."

(5) The following sub-section shall be inserted at the end of sub-section (3):—

"(4) The competent naval or military authority or any person authorised by him, or any police constable (without prejudice to the powers given by any other regulation):—

(a) if he suspects that any firearms, military arms, ammunition or explosive substances are, or are kept, in or upon any house, building, land, vehicle, vessel, or other premises in contravention of an order under this regulation, may enter, if need be by force, the house, building, land, vehicle, vessel, or premises, at any time of the day or night and examine, search and inspect the same or any part thereof, and may seize any firearms, military arms, ammunition or explosive substances found therein or thereon which he suspects to be, or to be kept, therein or thereon in contravention of the order; and

(b) if he suspects that any person is carrying any firearms, military arms, ammunition or explosive substances in contravention of any such order, may stop that person and search him; and

(c) may seize any firearms, military arms, ammunition, explosive substances or other articles carried by any person in contravention of any such order.

"Any firearms, military arms, ammunition, explosive substances or other articles seized under this regulation may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as may be ordered by the competent naval or military authority or chief officer of police."

4. Regulation 9DD shall be amended by the insertion at the end thereof of the following words:—

"Provided that nothing in this regulation shall apply to any exhibition or show at which no dogs are exhibited other than dogs usually kept at places situate within ten miles of the place where the exhibition or show is held, and for the purpose of this provision no dog shall in relation to any exhibition or show be deemed to be usually kept at any place unless it has been kept at that place for at least three months preceding the date on which that exhibition or show is held."

5. Regulation 39CC shall be amended by the insertion therein after the word "vessel" of the following words:—

"For the purpose of this regulation a person shall be deemed to purchase a ship or vessel if by means of the purchase of any shares in the ship or vessel or by means of the purchase of any shares, stock or debentures or other securities issued by a company, or by any other means whatsoever, he acquires the control of the ship or vessel, and

the expression 'the purchase of any ship or vessel' shall be construed accordingly."

6. The following regulation shall be inserted after Regulation 39DD:—

"39DD. (1) There shall be included in every contract for the charter of any British ship registered in the United Kingdom, and in every contract made in the United Kingdom for the charter of any ship not being such a British ship, a provision making the validity of the contract conditional on the approval of the Shipping Controller being given thereto.

"(2) The owner of any ship with respect to which any such contract as aforesaid is made or, if the contract is made by some person as agent of the owner that person, shall within fourteen days after the date on which the contract is made deliver a copy thereof to the Shipping Controller:

"Provided that where any such contract is not made in the United Kingdom there shall be substituted for the period of fourteen days as aforesaid a period of fourteen days after the date on which a copy of the contract, if posted at the place where the contract is made immediately after the making thereof, would in due course of post reach the United Kingdom.

"(3) If any person

(a) being the owner of any ship, whether by himself or by any agent, enters into any contract, being such a contract as aforesaid, which does not comply with the foregoing requirements: or

(b) being a person required as aforesaid to deliver to the Shipping Controller a copy of any contract fails so to do within the time hereinbefore allowed in that behalf: or

(c) fails to comply with any of the conditions subject to which any approval has been granted by the Shipping Controller under the foregoing provisions,

he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations, and any contract made in contravention of this regulation shall be void.

"(4) Where any such contracts as aforesaid which have been made before the fifth day of February, nineteen hundred and eighteen and are in force on that date do not contain such a provision as aforesaid, the Shipping Controller may, if he is of opinion that it is necessary so to do for the purpose of organising or maintaining the supply of shipping in the national interests in connection with the present war, by order direct that the contracts shall cease to have effect as from the date specified in that behalf in the order.

"Any such order may apply either generally to all such contracts, or to contracts of any specified class or description, or to particular contracts.

"(5) In this regulation the expression 'ship' and 'British ship' have the same meaning as in the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1916, and the expression 'contract' includes an agreement of any kind, and where the person with whom a contract for the charter of a ship is made is himself a charterer of the ship that person shall for the purposes of this regulation and so far as relates to that contract be deemed to be the owner of the ship."

7. After Regulation 41AAA the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"41AB. (1) Before any male person apparently of military age is taken into or engages in any employment in Great Britain or a contract for such employment is entered into with him, the proposed employer shall take all reasonable steps to obtain the production of any certificate of exemption or protection affecting him and other evidence relating to his position for the time being with regard to liability for military service.

"(2) Any person who in the ordinary course of his business is in communication with any male person apparently of military age with a view to such person being taken in or engaged in any employment in Great Britain shall take the like steps as are required in the case of the proposed employer.

"(3) Any person apparently of military age seeking to be taken into or engaged in any employment in Great Britain shall produce all such documents and disclose all such evidence as the proposed employer or such person as aforesaid is entitled under this regulation to require, and he shall also answer to the best of his ability and knowledge any questions which may reasonably be addressed to him by or on the behalf of the proposed employer or such person as aforesaid in relation to his position for the time being with regard to liability for military service.

"(4) If any person fails to comply with any of the provisions of this regulation or makes any false or misleading statement as to any fact or matter which he is bound by this regulation to disclose, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"(5) This regulation shall be in addition to, and not in derogation of, the provisions of any Statute or of these regulations relating to the employment or concealment of deserters or absentees from the Army or the Army Reserve or the production of certificates of exemption."

8. Regulation 42c shall be amended as follows:—

(1) By the substitution for the words "for employment by the Army Council" of the words "nineteen hundred and seventeen, for employment by the Army Council, or entered for service under the direction of the Admiralty, after the fifth day of February, nineteen hundred and eighteen."

(2) By the insertion at the end thereof of the following new sub-section:—

"(2) The Admiralty may by order authorise any persons entered for service under their direction as aforesaid to exercise in relation to any other persons so entered any of the powers which may be exercised by naval or military patrols in relation to members of His Majesty's naval and military Forces."

9. After Regulation 61 the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"61A. A certificate purporting to be signed by a recruiting official of the Ministry of National Service that a notice calling up a man from the army reserve to report for military service has been delivered at, or sent by post to such man addressed to, his last known place of abode shall, in any proceedings taken against such man for failure to comply with

the notice, be evidence unless the contrary is proved that such notice has been so delivered or sent.

"Such certificate shall until the contrary is proved be deemed to have been signed by such recruiting official without proof of the official character of the person appearing to have signed it."

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Aliens Restriction (Consolidation) Order, 1916, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred by the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, has been pleased to impose restrictions on aliens and to make various regulations for carrying those restrictions into effect:

And whereas it is expedient to extend the provisions of that Order in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. In Article 12A for "nationality or identity" there shall be substituted "nationality and identity."

2. In subsection (2) of Article 22A the words "as from such date or dates as may be fixed by order of a Secretary of State," and in subsection (6) of the same Article the words "unless he has already sent such notice," shall be omitted.

For the words in subsection (8) of Article 22A down to and including the words "Minister of Munitions" there shall be substituted the words "The occupier of every establishment in which munitions work is carried on."

3. After Article 22B the following Article shall be inserted:—

22c.—(1) As from the first day of March, nineteen hundred and eighteen (hereinafter referred to as "the appointed date"), a male alien between the ages of 18 and 61 shall not undertake or perform work for an employer or accept employment in any of the trades, industries and occupations mentioned in the Fifth Schedule to this Order, unless permission in writing has been obtained by him from the Director-General of National Service and is for the time being in force, and to obtain such permission application shall be made by the alien in person to a Labour Exchange:

Provided that an alien to whom this Article applies who was on the appointed date engaged on any such work as aforesaid in the employment of an employer may continue to perform that work under that employer without any such permission as aforesaid until notice to the contrary is sent or given to him and to his employer by the Director-General.

(2) A person shall not after the appointed date employ any alien or engage or take any steps to engage any alien for employment on any work if the alien is by this Article prohibited from undertaking or performing the work.

(3) A person employing any alien to whom this Article applies in any such trade, industry

or occupation as aforesaid shall forthwith take steps to bring to the notice of the alien the provisions of this Article, and shall comply with any directions given by the Director-General of National Service for the purpose of giving full effect to any provisions of this Article.

(4) A person who is on the appointed date employing any alien to whom this Article applies in any such trade, industry or occupation as aforesaid shall forthwith send notice of the fact to the Director-General of National Service, which notice shall be in the form and shall contain the particulars set out in Part I. of the Sixth Schedule to this Order; and where any such alien so employed leaves, or is about to leave, such employment, his employer shall, before he leaves, or within forty-eight hours after he leaves, send notice of the fact to the Director-General, which notice shall be in the form and shall contain the particulars set out in Part II. of the said Sixth Schedule.

(5) Any alien to whom this Article applies shall, if so required by the Director-General of National Service, attend for inquiry at such time and place as the Director-General may direct.

(6) Any permission given by the Director-General of National Service to an alien under this Article may be made subject to such conditions as the Director-General may think fit to impose on the alien to whom it was granted, and may be at any time revoked or varied by the Director-General.

(7) The Director-General of National Service may by order after consulting a Secretary of State and the Minister of Labour, add any trade, industry or occupation to the list of trades, industries and occupations mentioned in the said Fifth Schedule, or remove any trade, industry, or occupation from that list, and this Order shall thereupon have effect accordingly.

(8) This Article shall not apply in respect of any alien employed or accepting employment in pursuance of a permission granted under Article 22A or Article 22B of this Order.

4. The following Article shall be inserted after Article 25c:—

25d. Where a Secretary of State is satisfied as respects any alien enemy, whether by means of a certificate from the Polish National Committee or otherwise, that the alien:

(a) is by race a Pole; and

(b) is well disposed towards the interests of His Majesty and His allies;

the Secretary of State may if he thinks fit grant to that alien a certificate of exemption from all or any of the provisions of this part of this Order, except such as apply to alien friends.

5. In the definition of "Belgian refugee" in Article 31 after the word "alien" there shall be inserted the word "friend":

For the definition of "munitions work" in Article 31 there shall be substituted the following definition:—

The expression "munitions work" means work of whatever nature in any establishment, in which munitions work as defined by Section nine of the Munitions of War (Amendment) Act, 1916, is carried on.

6. At the end of subsection (2) of Article 34 there shall be inserted the words "and as if this Order were an Act of Parliament."

7. After the Fourth Schedule the following Schedules shall be inserted:

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council of His late Majesty dated the 10th January, 1910, it was ordered that Stanley Mordaunt Leathes, Esquire, and Herbert Woodfield Paul, Esquire, or such other persons as His Majesty might from time to time approve in the stead of them, or any of them, should be His Majesty's Commissioners for testing, in conformity with Her late Majesty's Order in Council dated the 4th June, 1870, or such further Order or Orders as His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, had issued or might issue in that behalf, the qualifications of persons proposed to be appointed to situations or employments in His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and also for testing, in conformity with Regulations to be from time to time issued by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for War, the literary qualifications of candidates for admission by means of competitive examinations to the Royal Military College at Sandhurst, and to the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, and should hold their offices during the pleasure of His Majesty, the said Stanley Mordaunt Leathes, Esquire, being First Commissioner; and should have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time such Assistant Examiners and others as might be required to assist them in the performance of their duties:

And whereas by a further Order in Council of His late Majesty, also dated the 10th January, 1910, (hereinafter called the Consolidating Order in Council), it was ordered that so much of the said Order in Council of the 4th June, 1870, and of certain other Orders in Council, making provision for testing according to fixed rules the qualifications of persons who might seek or be proposed for appointment, either permanently or temporarily, to situations or employments in any of His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and for regulating the conduct of His Majesty's said Civil Establishments, as was then in force, should be repealed, and that the provisions of the Consolidating Order in Council should have effect in substitution thereof:

And whereas the said Herbert Woodfield Paul, Esquire, retired from his office as such Commissioner as aforesaid on the 16th January, 1918:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, as from the date of this Order, the said Stanley Mordaunt Leathes, Esquire, C.B., and David Beveridge Mair, Esquire, and Lawrence Cary Hampton Weekes, Esquire, or such other persons as His Majesty may from time to time approve in the stead of them, or any of them, shall be His Majesty's Commissioners for testing, in conformity with the Consolidating Order in Council, or such further Order or Orders in Council as His Majesty may issue in that behalf, the qualifications of persons proposed to be appointed to situations or employments in His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and also for testing in conformity with Regulations to be from time to time issued by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for War, the literary qualifications of Candidates for admission by means of competitive examinations to the Royal Military College at Sandhurst, and to the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, and shall hold their offices during the pleasure of His Majesty; the said Stanley Mordaunt Leathes, Esquire, being First Commissioner; and the said David Beveridge Mair, Esquire, and Lawrence Cary Hampton Weekes, Esquire, being Assistant Commissioners, holding also the offices, respectively, of Director of Examinations and Secretary to the Civil Service Commission, and shall have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time such Assistant Examiners and others as may be required to assist them in the performance of their duties.

WHEREAS by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in China:

And whereas it is desirable to make provision for the control of shipbuilding by persons subject to such jurisdiction during the continuance of the present war, and for such further period as the national interests may require:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The China (Control of Shipbuilding) Order in Council, 1918," and shall be read as one with "The China Order in Council, 1904" (hereinafter called the "Principal Order"), and with any Order amending the same.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to lay down, build, or construct, or to direct or assist in the laying down, building, or construction of a ship within the limits of the Principal Order without the previous consent in writing of the Minister, provided that this Article shall not apply to the completion of a ship which was actually under construction at the date of the making of this Order.

3. If any person lays down, builds, or constructs, or directs, or assists in the laying down, building, or construction of a ship in contravention of this Order, the ship, or part of a ship, so laid down or constructed shall be forfeited to the Crown, and the person so acting in contravention of this Order shall be liable to imprisonment, without hard labour, not exceeding six months, and to a fine not exceeding 500 dollars for every day during which such contravention continues; and, if such person be a company, every director and officer of the company shall be liable to the like penalty, unless he proves that the contravention took place without his knowledge or consent.

4. This Order shall come into force on the 1st day of March, 1918.

THE FLAX (IRISH CROP) ORDER, 1918.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers thereunto enabling him, hereby gives Notice and Orders as follows:—

(1.) He hereby takes possession as from the 1st July, 1918, of:—

All flax of 1918 crop grown in Ireland as and when harvested.

(2.) The flax of which possession is hereby taken under paragraph 1 will be divided under the directions of the Director-General of Aircraft Production into six grades according to its quality, handling and cleaning, and the Minister will pay the following prices therefor:—

First Grade, 40s. per stone, delivered at the appointed centre.

Second Grade, 38s. per stone, delivered at the appointed centre.

Third Grade, 36s. per stone, delivered at the appointed centre.

Fourth Grade, 34s. per stone, delivered at the appointed centre.

Fifth Grade, 32s. per stone, delivered at the appointed centre.

Sixth Grade, 30s. per stone, delivered at the appointed centre.

Flax which is inferior in quality to that of the sixth grade hereinbefore mentioned, will be taken over and paid for according to its relative value.

(3.) All flax of the 1917 crop, or previous years, grown in the United Kingdom will continue to be graded and paid for in the terms of the Order dated 25th August, 1917.

(4.) All flax grown in the United Kingdom in 1917, or previous years, must be scutched and marketed by 1st July, 1918.

(5.) The Minister intends to take possession on or after 1st July, 1918, of all flax of the 1917 crop, or previous years, not marketed on that date, whether scutched or not, and to pay for it in accordance with the Order dated 25th August, 1917, less any expenses incurred by the Government in so doing.

(6.) Growers of flax in the United Kingdom who cannot have their flax of 1917, or earlier crops, scutched and marketed by 1st July, 1918, shall communicate not later than 1st May, 1918, with the Administrator of the Flax Supplies Committee, 44, Chichester Street, Belfast, who will then make the necessary arrangements to provide for the scutching and marketing of such flax.

(7.) Non-compliance with any part of this Order will constitute an offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

1. Two light-vessels and four light-buoys have been moored to mark a gateway in the Dover channel off Folkestone, as shown on the charts.

2. Shipping is hereby warned that the *only* passage for traffic proceeding between the Downs and Dungeness is between the North-East and South-East gate light-buoys and then between North and South Folkestone gate light-vessels shown on the chart, and between North-West and South-West gate light-buoys and *vice versa*, and that Article 25 of the Collision Regulations must be complied with, that is to say, East-bound traffic must keep to the Southern side of the passage and West-bound traffic must keep to the Northern side. Ships disregarding this warning will do so at their own peril.

3. *Caution.*—Mariners are warned to exercise great caution when approaching the ships' passage between the Folkestone gate light-vessels, as the tidal streams may at times set obliquely across the passage. Both light-vessels should be given as wide a berth as the width of the passage and compliance with Article 25 of the Collision Regulations permit.

4. The latest route information and route instructions are to be obtained from the examination vessels off Calais and Boulogne, or in the Downs or from Patrol vessels westward of Folkestone gate or in the vicinity of Cape Gris Nez. 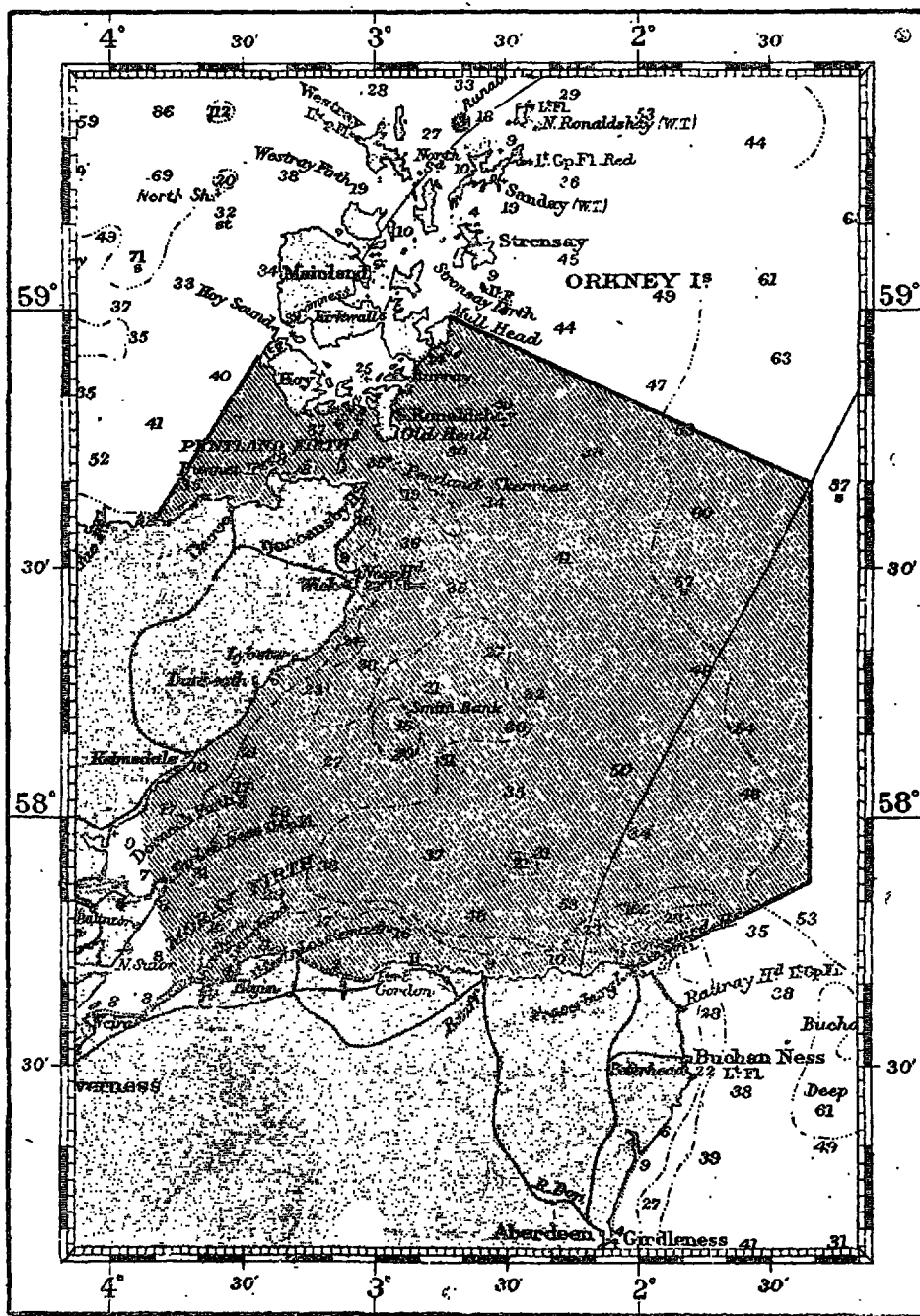

Pilotage is compulsory at the ports of Cromarty and Inverness for all vessels (including fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and it is highly dangerous for any vessel to enter or leave without a pilot. Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty and Inverness will be led through the defences from a position off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should follow directly astern of her.

Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty or Inverness.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under way between sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbet ness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.

(2) Orkney Isles—Traffic Regulations.

I.—SCAPA FLOW AND APPROACHES.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.

2. Examination services have been established in the entrances to Hoxa and Hoy sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow the instructions received from her very carefully.

3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually ordered to Scapa Flow.

4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to Stromness.

5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

II.—PORT OF KIRK WALL AND APPROACHES.

1. The port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.

2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.

3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours of darkness, *i.e.*, between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.

4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.

5. No vessel other than H.M. Ships or boat

shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.

6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save and except only (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the harbour, the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.

7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.

8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).

9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of the Boom trawler and repeated at the Hellier holm lighthouse.

10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance against the signal.

11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Hellier holm:—

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":

By day—Two balls, vertical.

By night—A red light.

"Open for Outgoing Traffic":

By day—A cone, point upwards.

By night—A green light.

Gate Closed: By day—Three balls at Hellier holm.

By night—Three red lights at Hellier holm.

12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given priority over those leaving.

13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately 285° (*N. 56° W. Mag.*), one mile from the entrance.

14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite for the anchorage on entering.

15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

16. No incoming vessel shall pass Hellier holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is up at Hellier holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.

17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way, and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.

18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first and the rear ship

shall then keep a full half mile directly astern, and is on no account to close or overhaul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.

19. *Caution.*—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening and attains considerable velocity, especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-westerly direction.

Variation.—19° W.

(3) *Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.*

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

Note.

This Notice is a re-publication of the former Notices quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.
