

The London Gazette.

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Plimouth, July 9.

This day arrived here one ship of London and another belonging to this place, both of them from Virginia. The *Mary-Rose* and *Race* which are still here, expecting the arrival of the Lord *Henry Howard*, designed Ambassador to the Emperor of *Morocco*.

Legorne, June 28. The 26th instant put in her Gracious Bark in eight dayes from *Cagliari* in the Island of *Sardigna*, telling us, that upon the day of his departure from thence, there arrived two Gallies of the Sicilian Squadron, with some Companies of Foot, for the assistance of the Viceroy, as also that a little before his departure the Viceroy had ordered his Edict to be published, against the Principal Heads of the late Tumults and Insurrection in the said Island, proclaiming them Traitors and Rebels against his Catholic Majesty, and particularly the Marquiss *di Sida*, the Marquiss *di Villa Fritta*, the Marquiss *dell Aquila*, with one other Marquiss, and Don *Francessco* a Portuguesse, Captain of the Gallies: offering a considerable summe of moneys to such persons as should apprehend or discover them. He has also caused the Pallace of the Marquiss *di Villa Fritta* in *Cagliari* to be pulled down to the middle story of its Building, and ordered the remaining part of it to be employed as a place of Quarters for the soldiers.

They further tell us, that the Sardinian Gallies having been employed to transport some Companies of Foot to a City of that Island called *Lepo*, found two Gallies of *Algier* which were endeavoring to put into Port, but upon sight of those of *Sardigna* went away with all the speed they were able, and were for some time pursued, but to little purpose, the Turkish Gallies being nimble at the Oar.

Rome, June 29. On Tuesday last in the afternoon there was a great Assembly of the Cardinals, Princes, Princesses, Prelates, Ladies, and Persons of greatest quality about the Town, at the first Opening and Exercise of a new Academy erected in the Pallace of *Rossigliosi*, where they were entertained with several learned and elegant discourses by several Members of that Society, and an honourable Treat given to all the Company of the Auditors.

On Wednesday was celebrated with much solemnity the Anniversary for the Popes Coronation, and the same day the Pope received the Compliments, on this occasion from the Cardinals, the whole City the preceding, as well as the following Evening, demonstrating their joy by exhibiting lights at their Windows, with Fire-works in several places, and the Castle discharging the Great Guns.

From *Sicily* we are assured, that the Fiery Torrent from Mount *Erna* is wholly extinguish, having first ruined many houses near the walls of the City of *Catania*, but in recompence has out of the vast quantities of its congealed matter formed them a convenient Port over against the Castle, in which the waters are 70 foot deep, able to contain many ships.

Since the extinction of this Fire, Publick Thanks have been given to God in all the most principal Churches of that Kingdom, for their deliverance from that terrible Calamity.

Yesterday in the Evening, it being the Eve or Vigil of

St. Peter, the Pope was present in the Chappel of the *Quirinal*, where he heard Vespers, which ended, the Spanish Ambassador with a great Train of Princes and Noblemen, attended the Pope at the door of the said Chappel, and presented the Pope with the Horse and Moneys the usual Tribute for the Kingdom of *Naples*.

Legorne, July 1. The ships expected from *England* being (as is believed) past by on their return for *England*, the *Frigates* which attended for their Convoys, departed hence the 28th past for *Alexand* and *Cadix*, and the same day arrived here the *Concord* of *Tarmouth* from *Lisbonne* and *Genova* laden with Sugars, &c. the French team daily more and more distastful with those of *Algiers*, they having not yet comply'd with them in giving satisfaction for a French ship according to their promise, but have since given them a new provocation in taking 17 *Galgognes* prisoners out of one of their Barks, pretending they were not Subjects to His most Christian Majesty.

We have here a report that the Turks have much pressed the City of *Candia* on the side of the Battalion *St. Andrew*, and have received a considerable success. The Auxiliary Gallies were 15 days since at *Mellina*, attending each hour to put to sea from thence for *Candia*.

Dantzick, July 6. From *Warsaw* we find that the People are generally very well satisfied with the New Election, and there is not the least appearance of any opposition; they have appointed the 26th of September for the day of the Coronation of their New King, who has already disposed of several Charges, and particularly has conferred that of High Chamberlain upon *Lugmiersky*, promising not to prefer any persons but Roman Catholics, and those of his own Nation, which has already much gain'd him the affection of the People.

Venice, July 6. On Sunday last arrived here a vessel from *Zante*, informing us that the Provost-General was with a Squadron of his Fleet attending there the arrival of the Auxiliary Gallies, and that another Squadron was for the same purpose at *Corjou*.

Letters of the 23 of *May* from *Candia* affirm, that upon the arrival of the *Ludemburgers*, a heavy fall was made by them upon the Turks at the Battalion *St. Andrew*, in which they forced them out of the lower part, which was before posses'd by them, and ruined the Works cast up by them, but that the Turks continue to make frequent attempts upon the same place, by which means the Garrison is kept to so hard Duty, that the Generalissimo has been obliged to command many soldiers aboard this Fleet to part themselves into the Town for their relief.

The Senate is dispatching away the Convoys designed for *Candia*, whereon are already embarked, 1500 able soldiers, whereof the greater number, viz. 850 were rais'd by the Duke of *Modena*, with a large proportion of Provisions and Money, and are ordering another Convoys to be fitted up to follow them.

This week arrived here several Companies intended for the same service, and amongst others, the late raised soldiers in *Piedmont*, and some others from *Germany*.

From *Zante* we are farther advis'd, that *Sieur Nicolo Lion* is there arriv'd with a Squadron of the Fleet for the Transportation of the Horse designed for the Land-service in the Isle of *Candia*.

Paris, July 20. His Majesty being inform'd, that a Cousin German to the new Elected King of *Poland*, has been for some time under a restraint in this City, upon a Debt of 8000 livres, was lately pleas'd to discharge the summe

summe for him, and to make him moreover a Present for the Defraying his expences on his return for Poland. We have here various reports of the present state of affairs in that Kingdom, and that those of *Pashuania* with the Great *Marechal Sobiesky*, the Great Chancellor, and divers of the Senators are not yet satisfied with the Election; but for a better light into these affairs several Courtiers have this week been dispatcht to the Bishop of *Besiers* our Ambassador there, with Orders for his speedy return, as soon as his business there can permit him, to take upon him another Employment under the same Character to the Court of *Spain*; and 'tis said His Majesty amongst other Compliments to the New King, has made him an Offer of assisting him with Money for the payment of his Army.

The King has deferred his coming to Parliament till the 29th of this Moneth, being willing to give his father time to the Chamber of Justice, to finish several affairs under their hands, before their suppression.

The Dauphin is yet distempred with a continual Fever, with many severe accessions; for which he has been four times let Blood, but as yet his Physicians cannot find what Nature has any way began to discharge its self of those Humors which cause his indisposition, nor do they find any considerable effects of their other applications.

His Majesty designs a journey to *Chambourgh* about the middle of the next Moneth, if nothing extraordinary intervene to prevent it; about which time he may dismiss and break up the Camp at *St. Sebastiens*.

We have not heard any farther certain news from the Duke of *Beaufort* since his being seen with the Fleet about the height of *Malta*. The Countrey which was sent with a Paquet to him, carries him inclosed a permission (if the affairs of *Candia* require it) to go on shore with the soldiers which belong to the Men of War, and to employ them against the Enemy.

Here is lately arrived a Letter from the Marquis de *St. Andre Montbrun* at *Candia* dated the 29th of *May*, importing, that the Turks were with all diligence mounting their Cavalry, and had summoned in all the Inhabitants of the Island and employed them at their Works before the Town; and that the Viceroy gave out, that he was resolved to engage the succours immediately upon their landing, but believed not that their numbers were halfe so considerable as report made them to be; the Marquis adding, that if the said succours were fewer then the Turks were willing to believe them, he made no doubt but that upon their appearance they should be able to force the Turks from the breaches, and in spite of all their attempts to defend the Town for a year longer, though the Turks were Masters of the Bastion *St. Andre*.

The Cardinal de *Pendofme* has lately given an account of a Letter written to him by the Consul of *La Ciotat* in *Provence*, giving him notice of the arrival there of a Bark the 9th instant in 40 days from *Candia*, the Master of the said Bark affirming, that at his departure from thence last, the Sieur de *Almeras* was with three men of War and one Fireship at the Island of *Milos* expecting the return of a Chaloupe which he had some time before sent to *Larissa* to sound the intentions of the *Ottoman* Court, and to bring him an account of affairs concerning the Sieur de *la Haye*, our Ambassador; He farther tells, that three Venetian ships passing by the Sieur de *Almeras*, obliged them to salute the French Flag with 5 Guns, which he answered onely with 2; farther telling, that upon his way home-wards he discovered between the Islands of *Sapientza* and *Serigo* on the 17th of *June*, a Fleet of about 70 sail, which he supposed to be the French Fleet making for *Candia*.

Letters from the Netherlands inform us, that although the Constable of *Castile* has been prevailed with to give leave for the passing of the Coal-Boats, his Concession has hitherto been rendered inefficual by the letting go the Sluices, by which means the River and Channels are so low drained, that no Boat is able to pass, nor if the Sluices were stop'd, can the Rivers be rendered again capable in near a Moneths time to carry down the said Boats, of

which we suppose ere this a Complaint has been made

The Duke of *Lorraine* seems very apprehensive of some attempt, especially, having intelligence that a strong party of Horse and Dragoons are ordered forthwith to march out of *Luxembourg*, whose motion tis supposed will much depend upon the success of the Gentleman, who the 10th instant was dispatcht by His Majesty into *Lorraine*.

The Prince of *Tuscany* is suddenly expected here from *Holland*, for whom a rich Coach is here making. The Baron de *Leroas* has received Orders from the Duke of *Nenbourg* to take his leave of this Court, but first, to make his due return of thanks to His most Christian Majesty for the good Offices done to his said Master towards the preference of his interest in *Poland*, though they have proved successless; the said Baron went yesterday accordingly to *St. Germain*, where he had his Audience from their Majesties.

The Venetian Ambassador has lately received by an Express, the news that Count *Waller* has with the *Lunenburghers* lately arrived at *Candia*, made a successful sally upon the Enemy, and recovered from them all the ground which the Turks had before won upon the City, and had led great numbers of the Turks in that action.

Oxford, July 11. On Friday last the University being Assembled in a full body, went to take possession of the new Theatre, the Magnificent Benefaction of his Grace the Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*, where after the reading of his Grace's Grant by the Register of the University, Dr. *Solih* the publick Orator made an excellent speech upon the occasion; in the afternoon, being again assembled and placed in the Theatre, after the loud Musick had sounded, were pronounced several Panegyricks, the first in Prose, then one in *Pindarick Verse*, after that an Oration, then a Dialogue in Poetry, which having taken up a considerable time, the Auditory was diverted with excellent Musick, Vocal, and Instrumental, which ending, they were again entertained with another Oration, followed by two Speeches in Poetry, and afterwards by a discourse in favor of Learning, then a short Speech from the Musick Gallery, uttering in two Odes which were excellently sang, after which followed another Speech which concluded the solemnity of that day.

London, July 12. On Monday the 5th instant arrived at *Milford* an Yacht from *Dublin*, Captain *Shortin* Comtander, with her Grace the Duchess of *Ormond*, who at her landing was with much respect complimented and entertained by Sir *Hugh Owen*, from thence she intended for *Golden Grove*, where the Earl of *Carbery* had made preparation for her reception; on Monday last she was expected at *Hereford*, on Tuesday at *Glocester*, and on Wednesday at *Oxford*, whither His Grace the Duke of *Ormond* is gone to receive her on her way hither.
