29th past which say, Two Couriers arrived there that Morning in Eight Days from Barcelona, with Letters to the Emperor and the Duke of Savoy from the King of Spain. Our
Letters of the 4th from Milan say, the Detachment for Naples continued its March, and would by this time, as was
suppos'd, enter that Kingdom, where the Vice-Roy had rais'd
a Tumultuary Body of Forces to oppose them, whick, according to some Letters, amount to 20000 Men. We hear from
Turin of the first Instant, That the Duke of Savoy's Insantry
was to rendezvous at Orlessan on the 11th; that his Cavalry
was already encamp'd at Rivoli; and that the German Troops
were to arrive there the 6th.

Oranienberg, June 13. At the first Arrival of the Princess
Royal, with the Prince her Husband, this little Town was
